





Are you prepared for \$8.00/gallon gas?

If you're expecting oil and natural gas prices to drop back to "normal" after Katrina/Rita hurricane repairs are completed, don't count on it. This one-two punch to our nation's energy-producing center has worsened a worldwide gas and oil crisis that has heen growing for years.

Diminishing supplies of cheap, abundant oil and gas represent an unprecedented challenge for our way of life. It threatens the very things we take for granted: an evergrowing economy, current modes of transportation, and cheap imported food and other goods.

How can our community respond to this challenge and soften its local impacts?

World oil production is peaking

U.S. oil production peaked 35 years ago in 1970. As a result, we now import 65% of the oil we need to maintain our lifestyle. Worldwide discourries of oil peaked even before that, in 1962. The world now consumes four barrels of oil for every one discovered. Many experts consider production will peak–reach its maximum and begin to decline—within the next five years. After that, oil will be more difficult and expensive to extract. Available supply will fall below global needs.

Why is cheap oil important to us?

Cheap, abundant oil and gas have been the foundation of our society. Oil provides nearly 40 percent of our primary energy and 70 percent of our transportation fuel. It powers our cars, trucks, trains, planes, and ships. It heats our homes and factories. It fuels power plants. It's the raw material for plastics, fabric, and cosmetics. Almost everything we have or of relies on fossil fuels.
